Subject: Mining Sand for Beach Replenishment along the Chesapeake Bay Beaches

Dear Governor McDonnell:

The City Council has included an item in its legislative agenda for the 2013 session regarding the mining of sand for beach replenishment along the Chesapeake Bay beaches. I know you are very familiar with this area, especially the severe erosion and loss of property that has taken place due to severe nor'easters and most recently, Hurricane Sandy. The City has been performing nourishment of portions of our Bay beaches utilizing the Lynnhaven Inlet dredged material provided by the Corps of Engineer navigation maintenance projects. Unfortunately, these small sand replenishment efforts occur every third year and, in no way, provide sufficient storm protection for adjacent properties. The most efficient, practical method of creating a Chesapeake Bay Beach Storm Protection Program is by mining sand from nearby sources in the Chesapeake Bay and directly pumping it onto our beaches using a hydraulic dredging process.

We on the Virginia Beach City Council recognizing the importance of creating a long term storm solution for our Bay front communities, appropriated funds for the purpose of conducting a study to determine if there was an engineering solution available by mining sand within the Chesapeake Bay. We are pleased to report that VIMS (Virginia Institute of Marine Sciences) performed the study for us, and determined that there are ample sources of sand available just short distances from the shoreline. Establishing a replenishment program would provide significant protection to the residential and commercial Bay front beach properties. A copy of the VIMS findings are posted on our City website, VBgov.com, for public review.

Obtaining the environmental permits for mining sand in the Chesapeake Bay has never been requested by the City of Virginia Beach, nor to our knowledge, by our sister city of Norfolk. It is our intent, however, to continue developing a long term storm protection program involving the widening of our Bay front beaches in order to reduce the intensity of storm surge and wave action

impacts to our beaches and dune system. We acknowledge this new program will require permit approvals from at least two state agencies and a consolidated federal permit issued by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The City of Virginia Beach has tremendous working partnerships with the Virginia Marine Resources Commission (VMRC), Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. It is our respectful request that you encourage the state agencies to prioritize streamlining this emerging process for sand mining permits and work collaboratively in establishing the necessary framework for developing an approval process. Rest assured we do not wish to avoid any environmental regulatory compliance issues; however, we recognize state agencies will be challenged to work through the details of creating a new solution for protecting life, property and the economic well-being of our municipalities adjacent to the Chesapeake Bay.

Our request is simply that your administration and subsequently the General Assembly favorably support pursuing the creation of a Bay Front Storm Protection Program which incorporates the replenishment of sand through mining of deposits within the Chesapeake Bay.

The damages along our Chesapeake Bay beaches caused by Hurricane Sandy underscore the critical nature of our request. The City staff has briefed our General Assembly delegation and, along with our community leaders, are available to sponsor a tour of our Bay front beaches so you and your staff can get a first-hand view of our needs and discuss our engineering solutions for enhancing the protection of what we feel is a critical asset to our economy and our quality of life. As always, I am certainly available to talk with you about this new initiative at a time convenient to you. Thank you as always for your great leadership of our Commonwealth.

Temporary bulkhead for Lesner explained

email from Dave Hansen posted unedited with permission:

Kal & Grace,

FYI - The "Temporary Bulkhead" as shown in the permit application and on the current design plans, is designed with steel sheeting with a tie-back system and a concrete cap. The length is approx 400 LF.

Timber is great for residential bulkheads, but it is not adequate for a commercial/industrial application like this.

Timber would not hold up for the construction duration. The cap would require cleats to tie-off and a timber cap would not provide an adequate anchor for loaded barges, boats, etc., to tie off.

The concrete cap provides more structural stability for the bulkhead design.

This concrete cap bulkhead design is more of a standard section that contractors are used to building.

As an alternate, a more expensive steel cap could be used, but in either scenario (steel or concrete) the cap needs to be more durable than timber.

As promised in my many briefings to your respective organizations we will visit this discussion just past the 50% construction stage to see how we are co-existing with our boating public. Regards, Dave

Chesapeake Bay Foundation/Ocean Park partnership

The CBF seeks local salvaged materials for living building at Pleasure House Point

Pursuing the most stringent sustainability standards for its planned environmental center at Pleasure House Point, the Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) is seeking salvaged building materials needed for the project.

CBF plans to construct the Brock Environmental Center to meet the "Living Building ChallengeTM," a set of strict environmental standards established by the International Living Future Institute that requires the facility to have "net zero" impact on the environment.

Toward that goal, one requirement is to use as many recycled or salvaged construction materials as possible, and CBF is seeking local sources for them. The salvage wish-list includes solid wood doors, solid wood flooring and interior wood trim, cabinets and hardware, granite or stone countertops, bathroom mirrors, lockers, ceramic tile, wooden barrels (for rain cisterns), cypress or cedar ship-lap style siding, wall-mounted sinks and a mop sink, and parking lot wheel stops.

"We are counting on the community to be a literal part of CBF's ambitious, environmentally sustainable project by donating approved construction materials," said Christy Everett, CBF Hampton Roads director. "The CBF Brock Environmental Center will be a national model of how to

live responsibly on the land while protecting our surrounding waterways."

The CBF Brock Environmental Center will become the hub for CBF's Hampton Roads office staff and the foundation's awardwinning environmental education programs, which take thousands of students and teachers onto local waterways



each year for in-depth Bay learning experiences. It will also provide office space for Lynnhaven River NOW and Virginia Beach Parks and Recreation staff, and serve as a venue for community meetings and collaboration. The center's footprint will include one acre of the 118-acre Pleasure House Point Natural Area on the northern most portion of the site.

Seen those big Menhaden boats fishing in the Chesapeake Bay?

Big news for little fish!

In December, the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission voted to limit the total amount of menhaden that can be harvested by a 20 percent reduction in the average catch over the past three years.

The Chesapeake Bay Foundation (CBF) has worked with a wide range of partners to achieve a more sustainable population of Atlantic menhaden in the Chesapeake Bay and along the Atlantic coast. CBF roundly applauds the Atlantic States Marine Fisheries Commission for adopting a strong, science-based plan to better protect menhaden, a fish vital to the marine ecosystem and to important commercial fisheries.

The commission's action is a critical first step toward restoring healthy menhaden stocks along the Atlantic coast and in the Chesapeake Bay. It is historic and ultimately will benefit the Bay, wild-life, watermen, and anglers. It is equally critical that East Coast states from Maine to Florida implement the com-

mission's management plan. This is especially important in Virginia, where 80 percent of the coastwide menhaden catch is landed. In Virginia, the menhaden fishery is the only one managed by politicians, not scientists. CBF urges Virginia Governor

Bob McDonnell and the Virginia General Assembly to adopt the commission's management plan during the 2013 legislative session. Failure to do so could result in sanctions that threaten the livelihoods of thousands of hardworking Virginians. For more information, go to cbf.org/menhaden.



OPCL official business

OPCL Finance Committee Update:

The Robbins Legacy account held investments valued at approximately \$210,800 as of November 30, 2012. The four member Finance Committee met on December 13, to review the portfolio and rebalance the allocation as a result of appreciation of the current holdings to comply with the Robbins Account Investment Policy Statement. After the

rebalance the portfolio is allocated 69 percent fixed income/cash and 31 percent equity/balanced funds. In addition to appreciation from the original \$180,000 investment, the account continues generating approximately \$6000/year in interest and dividends.

If approved by the membership in January, \$7000 of the current cash balance of \$9000 will be distributed to fund the

OPCL budget for 2012.

OPCL Zoning Committee Update:

The zoning committee reviewed two issues in December. One issue was a request to allow a dune crossover to be constructed at 3792 Jefferson Blvd. where a new residence is to be constructed.

The committee fielded input from several residents concerned about the potential impacts to the dunes and setting a precedent that could lead to

more encroachment onto the dunes. The committee and OPCL board felt that the structure would be in violation of the Coastal Primary Sand Dune Act, which seeks to protect dunes from construction of hardened structures and preserve the natural barriers to coastal surges and flooding.

After sending a letter and meeting with city officials concerning the request, it appears that we have city support to deny and the request will not be permitted.

The committee also reviewed a request for a variance to a 10-foot, rearyard setback instead of 20 feet as required (Proposed Screened Porch) at 2245 Sunvista Drive. The committee did not field any concerns from neighbors and was not opposed to the request.

The BAC Meeting Wrap Up

The Bayfront Advisory Committee meeting notes for October were released.

Topics at the meeting included modifications to the Shore Drive Corridor Overlay and ordinance, implementation of the Neighborhood Sign project, design of a sense of arrival for tourists coming into the city via route 13, money for entertainment in the summer, recognition awards for individuals and companies in the community.

The Public Safety and Transit Strategies Committee reported continuing work on parking issues.

Community reports requested on Lynnhaven River NOW candidate forum, the Maple Street Transfer station, several community oyster roasts, and a possible water feature for Lake Joyce.

Live oak

A large number of common names are used for this tree, including "Virginia live oak," "bay live oak," "scrub live oak," "plateau oak," "plateau live oak," "escarpment live oak." It is also often just called "live oak" within its native area, but the full name "southern live oak" (Flora of North America) helps to distinguish it from other live oaks, a general term for any evergreen species of oak. Although evergreen,

the leaves persisting until the time growth resumes in spring

Their lower limbs often sweep down towards the ground before curving up again. They can grow at severe angles, and American Indians used to bend saplings over so that they would grow at extreme angles, to serve as trail markers.

The southern live oak has a deep tap-root that anchors it when young and eventually develops into an

extensive and widespread root system. This, along with its low center of gravity and other factors, makes the southern live oak extremely resistant to strong sustained winds, such as those seen in hurricanes.

They can withstand occasional floods and hurricanes, and are resistant to salt spray and moderate soil salinity. They tend to survive fire, because often a fire will not reach their crowns. Even if a tree is burned, its crowns and roots usually survive the fire and sprout vigorously. Furthermore, live oak although they grow best in well-drained sandy soils and loams, they will also grow in clay. Live oaks are also surprisingly hardy.

Live oak wood is hard, heavy, and difficult to work with, but very strong. In the days of wooden ships, live oaks were the preferred source of the framework timbers of the ship, using the natural trunk and branch angles for their strength. The frame of the USS Constitution was constructed from southern live oak wood harvested from St. Simon's Island, Georgia and the density of the wood grain allowed it to survive cannonade, thus earning it the nickname "Old Ironsides." Even today, the U.S. Navy owns extensive live oak tracts.

American Indians extracted a cooking oil from the acorns, used all parts of live oak for medicinal purposes, leaves for making rugs, and bark for dyes.

Did you know? A water oak is not the same as a live oak (Quercus nigra). Water oaks are deciduous (lose their leaves each fall).
