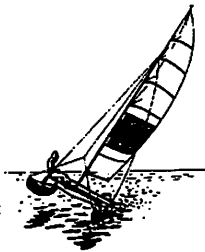

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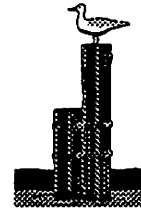

The Ocean Park Community lost a dear and cherished friend with the death of Louise Lyon on April 11th, 1999. The former Three Ships Inn was their home when her late husband George founded the Ocean Park Volunteer Fire and Rescue Squad which he served as Chief for 35 years.

The story goes that when the men of the newly organized Ocean Park Civic League were reluctant to allow women to take an active role, Louise founded the Ocean Park Womans Club. The club has flourished since 1944 with Louise always taking an active part in all activities.

Girl Scouting was another life long love - countless girls throughout Virginia Beach today can recount stories of their days as a member of Louise's troops. The Rescue Building was then the meeting place for such youth groups.

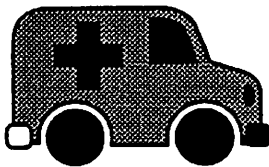

SPEED HILLS

Spring is in air. Soon, more of us will be jumping on our bicycles and skateboards, or putting on our jogging shoes to enjoy the outdoors in our neighborhood. The 11th Annual Clean Up the Bay Day

beaches, the other to cover the Lynnhaven Inlet area)**



Each year, tons of refuse, from many sources, enter the marine environment. Not only is it unsightly as it accumulates along the shoreline, but is threatening to marine wildlife. In an effort to put and end to the problem of marine debris, Clean the Bay Day beach cleanups have been conducted since 1989. This one-day effort enlists the help of citizens to pick up trash and document the type of litter found. The resulting data is used to identify and support policies and practices that address the use and disposal of wastes. A beneficial impact is the education of volunteers who participate in the cleanups and the environmental stewardship that result from it. More people are becoming aware of this noxious marine problem and express a genuine desire to help solve it.

In 1998 alone, 5,000 volunteers covered 323 miles and collected 802,965 pounds of marine debris and coastal trash.

On the occasion of the 11th Annual Clean Up the Bay Day, Saturday, June 12, 1999, we hope you will join with many other volunteers along the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries who will make an effort to enhance this grand natural asset.

The Neighborhood Watch



Mr. Mark Johnson, The Neighborhood Watch Program Coordinator, has been working hard and extremely diligently to bring this important program to fruition by summer. Support of this venture has been limited. Some residents assumed responsibilities of being block captains. More are needed.

A block captains' duties are to distribute crime prevention materials to the 10-15 homes in their block, exchange phone numbers with their neighbors so that they can communicate with each other should they see any suspicious activity in or around their homes, and answer any questions' neighbors in their block may have about the program.

There is a need to fill these positions with the onset of summer and with the influx of hundreds of thousands of visitors to Virginia Beach. As we have seen, when the tourists arrive, they have a propensity for exploring the city, especially areas near the water. Along with the tourists, come others: adolescent runaways, homeless people and drifters who are looking for an easy life in the sun and a place to sleep, often on the beaches. We are all aware of an increase of traffic on our back roads at that time, especially on the north side of Shore Drive during the dark early hours of the morning. Some people walk the beach along the bay, a few people sleep on the beaches, others look for a quiet parking place, and an infrequent interloper may look for a target of opportunity, perhaps, to purloin a piece of personal property that is an easy target, or even break into a house or storage shed. It does happen. During the summer there is an increase in crime.

In addition to block captains, we need a coordinator for the following areas: **PELICAN DUNES, MARINER'S LANDING** and **OCEAN PARK** (south of Shore Drive) A coordinator is responsible for establishing and coordinating the Neighborhood Watch in their section of their neighborhood.

MEETING: Anyone interested in participating in the program, as well as those people who have volunteered to be as block captains should attend a brief meeting on May 6, 1999, at 7:00 P. M. at the Ocean Park Fire & Rescue H. Q. We will meet prior to the Civic League meeting scheduled for the same evening at 7:30 p.m.

The following areas of Ocean Park have block captains and are beginning the "Neighborhood Watch"

Ocean Park: Jefferson Blvd (3898 from dead end at Water Oaks Condos to 3849 and from 3792 to Roanoke Avenue. Coverage needed from 3749 to 3796 Jefferson Boulevard and east of Roanoke Avenue) Raleigh Avenue---Seagull Bluff Drive---Dinwiddie Road (north of Shore Drive)---Dupont Circle (north of Jefferson Boulevard)

Pelican Dunes: West Stratford Road (entire street)--- Madison Avenue (from W. Stratford to Jefferson Blvd.

Mariner's Landing: Ocean Tides Drive (from Marlin Bay Drive to Clipper Bay Drive) ---Whispering Sands Lane (from Marlin Bay Drive to Clipper Bay Drive)---Clipper Bay Drive (from Ocean Tides Drive to the Rescue Squad Station)

Mark Johnson has undertaken a responsible job, one of cardinal importance, to assure the safety and well-being for the residents of Ocean Park. In every community, citizens are morally and legally responsible to protect each others property and security. Please lend your support to Mark's tireless efforts.

PROPOSED ZONING CHANGE IS BAD FOR OCEAN PARK

The Planning Commission is considering a proposal to "Include Garages and other covered parking structures in determining the floor area of single family dwellings, duplexes and semidetached dwellings in the R-5D (SD) and R-5R (SD) zoning districts " within the Shore Drive Corridor Overlay District.

The target of this proposal is the 2 unit condominiums being built in Ocean Park. Proponents of the proposal feel that it will reduce density. This will not reduce density because it will not reduce the ability to build 2 unit condominiums. It will only reduce the size of the condos to be built.

An example of how this will affect new condos to be built is as follows. A lot 50'X 125' would presently allow for two 2,187 sq. foot condos, not including garage space. The new proposal would require the garage space, say 275 sq. feet (1 car garage) to be included in the total square footage. The result is the sq footage of the living area would be reduced from 2,187 sq. ft. to 1912 sq. ft. per unit.

The effect of this proposal, if adopted, will be detrimental to Ocean Park for the following reasons:

elimination of garages-Builders will eliminate garages in order to build larger condos-As a result, there will be more cars on our narrow streets.

exterior stairs- Instead of "spacious and open" entrance foyers, builder will need to utilize exterior steps and 2nd level entrances. The result will not be attractive.

reduction in quality and design-Lower quality condos will be built due to the a reduction of the allowable square footage. Reducing the size of the units to be built will mean that builders will sell them for less money, forcing them to cut corners and use "cheaper " products. Design and appeal will be affected.

reduction in values-All owners of vacant lots or properties suited to be demolished will be affected.

Ocean Park is a neighborhood in transition. It is being transformed from a neighborhood of beach cottages, old bungalows, post war cinderblock homes and rental duplexes to a more upscale neighborhood of luxury homes and condos. For the most part, the condos being built are of good quality and design. Values have increased tremendously over the past 5 years because buyers have discovered that Ocean Park is a great neighborhood. Ocean Park has the potential to become an upscale beach community, offering a variety of housing to our residents.

Reducing the size of these condos will not stop them from being built. It will simply affect the quality and appearance of that which will be built. This size limitation will limit the potential of our neighborhood. Does Ocean Park want to return to the days of low quality, unattractive rental duplexes or proceed into the 21st century as an attractive, upscale neighborhood of quality homes and condominiums?
